#### SOGETSU IKEBANA DEMONSRATION

#### Kenmore Garden Club

Joan-Ann Kendall is a long-time ikebanist. She and I are both members of the Kenmore Garden Club, and were asked to end our club speakers' year, with a Christmas-themed Sogetsu ikebana demonstration on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> November 2017. Joan-Ann gave a short talk on the history of ikebana and the Sogetsu School in particular and included a description of the main principles.

I then commenced the demonstration with a moribana pattern exercise to show the main principles as I worked with the arrangement. Following this, I then created another eight freestyle arrangements, focusing on the colours and forms of Christmas/New Year.

To be well-prepared, all the materials were sourced from my mother Val's garden and mine, as well as from other local sources. Many of the plants were environmental weeds to show that even they can be used in arrangements. I then spent an entire day before the demonstration, choosing appropriate containers, kenzans and preparing down sticks and cross bars and spraying with gold some dried materials. The design of each arrangement was completed.

On the day, the talk and demonstration all went smoothly with the help of Joan-Ann. The audience of about 80 members had many questions at the end and expressed their delight in learning a little more about Sogetsu Ikebana.


"There is no final goal in learning..."
