Table Centrepiece Arrangements for the QAGOMA Foundation's 40 Annual Dinner

Following our success in providing table arrangements for their Foundation dinner last year, the QAGOMA Foundation contacted me, inviting Sogetsu ikebana to again do the table centrepiece arrangements for their Foundation's 40 th Annual Dinner on Saturday, 12 October.

After an initial meeting with two of the QAGOMA Foundation staff, some discussion at a Committee Meeting, and amongst our senior teachers, it was agreed that Sogetsu would be honoured to donate our services in constructing the table arrangements.

At previous annual dinners, the centrepiece arrangements have all been standardised, using similar flowers and vases. It was proposed that this year, instead of using the same type of vase for each table, we would source small, differently shaped ikebana containers, from our teachers and students which provided some variety in the arrangements, whilst keeping to a theme.

The criteria for the centrepieces was that the colours of the flowers had to complement the geometric artwork on the walls of the Water Mall in the Queensland Art Gallery, where the 19 tables would be set up, as well as the orange 40 Anniversary Annual Dinner Program/Menu.

There was much discussion about the type of flowers and material to be used and eventually Cycad leaves were agreed upon as the main material. As always seems to be the way, our first choice of flower, which was ordered, turned out not to be available. Subsequently orange, yellow and pink Ranunculi were chosen as the main flowers with some blue Iris added for contrast.

The arrangements were a great success and were commented upon favourably by the Gallery staff and attendees.

Of course, a project like this cannot be successful without good teamwork, and the team of Pat, Sue, Chris and Nicole worked tirelessly and very effectively to make it happen.

Some of us took a while to accomplish this technique, but when it worked well, it was exciting to see and hear the bamboo splitting into thin strips. Pat was also the expert "star shape" bamboo fabricator, assisting and helping those who wished to go home with their own little creation.

It was a hot fine day so having lunch under the covered open-sided shed was a welcome relief and a good opportunity to reflect on the morning's achievements and plan for the remaining projects after lunch.

It was a very enjoyable get-together and a great way to bond with our fellow ikebanists.


