3. Annual Workshop for Members on 9 & 10 June 2023 by Christopher James

We have a great opportunity to further our skills with the following workshops:

- a. An ikebana which emphasises water in a suiban and incorporates a stone.
- b. An ikebana which extends the arrangement in the area outside the container. Textbook 4-16 Paying attention to the place where the arrangement will be set. (This raises the question: What are all the essential elements that make up an ikebana?)
- c. Construction techniques for making larger structural arrangements. We will focus on dowelling. If you wish to make large freestanding work, you will need to work in pairs.
- d. An ikebana using two non-matching containers/vessels. More than 2 is recommended especially for advanced students.

Annual General Meeting - by Nicole Dorner Scales

We held our AGM on the 22nd of March this year with a good show of attendance from our Queensland members. We thank the Queensland Art Gallery for allowing us to use their lovely auditorium once again for this annual event.

Our guest speaker was Ms Giuliana Bonel, Marketing, Commercial and Experience Director at Brisbane Powerhouse, Queensland's home for contemporary culture.

The Powerhouse is situated in Yagara Country, New Farm, along the Brisbane River. It is a repurposed tram power station, constructed in stages between 1928 and 1940. It once supported the largest tram network in the southern hemisphere. After its

decommission in 1971, the building became a haven for the homeless, performers and graffiti artists, whose artwork is now known as heritage-listed aerosol art. Recently it has been listed by *Pedestrian* as 1 of the 11 most Instagrammable walls in the world.

Reborn as an arts centre the Powerhouse now features plays, concerts, shows and has become a home for festivals (such as MELT, Brisbane Comedy Festival and the Brisbane Festival). The month-long Hap Wah Night Food Market is held in March and October. Every Saturday morning the Jan Powers Farmers Market bring the freshest produce to the Brisbane Powerhouse forecourt. It is the most popular Saturday Market in Brisbane with over 120 stalls. Riverfront fine dining include the 5 star dining Bar Alto and relaxed dining Mary Mae's.

Ms Bonel shared her vision for the Powerhouse. In the next three years it can become the leader of contemporary art & culture. It also has a huge growth potential towards the Olympic Games to be held in Brisbane in 2032. This also includes a First Nations engagement strategy, which consists of a First Nations advisory committee, arts program, commissions of new Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander works, partnership with local and national First Nations Led Arts companies, Naidoc Week Program, cultural meeting place, permanent "threshold" artwork and cultural awareness and learning programs.

The new major outdoor projects include the Night Feast, fusion feasting plus art, Pleasuredome, a luxury sailcloth event space and an outdoor cinema, *Gold Class under the Stars*.

The Brisbane Powerhouse has been identified as a "Best of Queensland Experience by Tourism & Events Queensland" with 63% of their audiences returning multiple times a year. It has 270 000 social media followers with over 800 000 virtual interactions per year.

After Ms Bonel's informative presentation the actual AGM commenced and included the usual Agenda of Minutes of previous AGM (2022), Director's Report, Treasurer's Report, Election of Office Bearers for 2023-24, General Business and list of students having received certificates since the previous AGM.

Once the meeting closed, members enjoyed catching up at the QAG Cafe.

Introducing our new Director, Wendy Hoskin in her own words: "My Wonderful Journey with Ikebana

My earliest memories of Ikebana were my grandmother's arrangements that were always on the hall table and the coffee table. The containers on the hall table changed but the one on the coffee table was always the same, an oval container with the kenzan usually in Number One position. There were often three glass balls floating in the arrangement.

Grandmother Jean Jones and my mother, Beverley Woodcroft learnt Ikebana from grandma's aunt, Henrietta White, a teacher of floral art at the Brisbane Central Technical College. Henrietta was married to Cyril White, the State Government Botanist 1917 to 1950. He was a pupil to his grandfather, Fredrick Bailey, a Colonial Botanist in Queensland until 1915.

Plants and flowers were a large part of the White family's life. Henrietta must have gone to sessions being by Norman Sparnon as she began teaching Ikebana as part of her course at about the same time he was teaching in Brisbane.

Another vivid memory is grandma's garden with strelitzia, aspidistra, shrimp plant, poinciana and liquid amber. I have ikebana vases that would have been purchased by Auntie Ettie and grandma. The hasami is too small for my hands. Hands were obviously smaller fifty years ago! Kenzans have been pricking my fingers since childhood.

My first visit to an ikebana exhibition was in 2013. Amazing. I commenced classes with Pat in 2014 and have been attending classes with Pat ever since. This has been a time of self-reflection, learning, challenging myself, laughter and comraderie. Some arrangements take two hours to come together, and other times could be five minutes.

I love attending workshops led by members of our association. We have a huge collective knowledge of Sogetsu Ikebana and I am honoured to be a member of this group. Please, please make yourself available to attend these workshops. They are also a wonderful way of meeting fellow enthusiasts.

Working with children has been such a wonderful experience. As a schoolteacher, I was able to hold classes with students excelling at Japanese with both class lessons and group lessons. Their work was always showcased at a school event.

I now look at the world very differently. I can not go for a drive without constantly looking for ikebana foliage. Travelling for three months to South Australia resulted in a pile of wood strapped to the front of the van. The next trip saw the collection of rusty stuff!

My ikebana strengths lie with unconventional materials, using wood within arrangements and I love using aspidistra, both fresh and dried - aspidistra has been a constant in my work. Grandma used it regularly in her arrangements.

I thank members of the organisation for trusting me to continue to move our organisation forward."

What's SOGETSU?

I am sure that you are anxious sometimes with the series of unimaginable events that have occurred over the past few years. Although the situation remains chaotic, we realize that with only five years to go until the 100th anniversary of Sogetsu in 2027, we should start making preparations from now on in any case.

With that in mind, I chose the theme, "What's SOGETSU?" as we move toward this remarkable milestone.

The reason is that all of us - Sogetsu teachers, students, staff, etc. - should think about the question "What is Sogetsu?" once again from our unique standpoint.

I pinned my hope on this theme so that not only people who are already involved in Sogetsu but also those who have no idea what Sogetsu is, will develop an interest in it. I am often asked in interviews, "What is the difference between ikebana and flower arrangement?" To make it easier for

If you have no experience of this, why not get started on it? It's a great way to keep track of your own work, and I enjoy receiving all the various reactions in the comments. I strongly recommend it!

the general public to understand, I answer by saying, "ikebana is an aesthetic of subtraction, and flower arrangement is an aesthetic of addition." As you know, however, Sogetsu Ikebana can express both subtraction and addition. The most attractive feature of Sogetsu is that it can include both without any fixed restrictions. I think that is why we are able to express so much diversity. It would be a great waste to narrow down the possibilities by making assumptions off the top of our heads. However, an attitude of "I could have done it anyway" without commitment does not work. It will become even more important for us to observe and study various things with the flexible mindset that is typical of Sogetsu Ikebanists' strong curiosity, and transmit something that will make people who do not know about Sogetsu think, "I've never heard of Sogetsu before, but this is amazing!"

People take things for granted unless they are inspired to view new angles and chances slip by quickly. When being asked, "What is Sogetsu?" once again, one person may think, "I was rescued by Sogetsu," while another person may consider, "Sogetsu is healing for me." What is important after answering this question is to say it

out loud in your own words. For example, there is a big difference between someone who can proudly say, "I may not be able to do much on my own, but I want to cheer people up as much as I can, so I upload my ikebana on my social media site every time I arrange it" and people who say, "Well, I create my work without thinking about anything in particular." Of course, some people are not comfort able about being conspicuous or outspoken, which is by no means a bad thing. However, if each of us takes the opportunity to think about this theme, clarify it and speak out about how Sogetsu has made them feel, it is possible that some of you will find the power to do a lot for a world that is often suffering and in misery. something will surely move and "Why this theme now?" change. But it is precisely because we live in times like this that it's so relevant.

Of course, I, too, will ask myself very seriously, "What does Sogetsu mean to me as lemoto?" for the next five years. While exploring "This is SOGETSU" for each of us, we can prepare our minds and hearts for our Centennial!
